## THERE ARE RUMORS SOME ARE DENIED BY THE MEN AND SOME ARE CONFIRMED.

### KNIGHTS TEMPLAR COMPETITIVE DRILL.

#### Rochester Has a Destructive Fire in the Vacuum Oil Works—Foreign Ministers in China Not Satisfied With the Chinese Edict—Negro Ravisher Flees For His Life in Missouri.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 28.—Numerous rumors of propositions for bringing about an end of the steel workers' strike are afoot, but none have assumed a tangible shape and the conditions, generally, are unchanged today. Notwithstanding a report that the tin plate mill at Denmeier would resume operations this morning, no work is being done there today.

There was a break in the strike at the McClinock Marshall company's works at Rankin today, 150 men of the mill, who quit yesterday, returning to work. The company granted riveters an increase of five per cent and the laborers were advanced 12 cents per day. This trouble had no connection with steel workers' strike.

Wheeling dispatches this morning say that nothing is known of an alleged conference of labor leaders, said to have been recently held there to devise plans to settle the steel strike and it is believed to be without foundation.

#### COMMITTEE ON REVISION.

#### COMPETITIVE DRILL.

By the Knights Templar and a Business Meeting Both Held.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 28.—The competitive drill by crack commanderies of the country attracted the crush of Knights Templar conclave visitors to Churchhilltown today. While the knights were drilling, the business meeting of the grand encampment got underway at the girls' high school building, 120 knights being present.

#### ROOSEVELT'S WESTERN TRIP.

Will Speed Today With His Children and Start Tomorrow.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Vice-President Roosevelt will begin his western trip Thursday morning, leaving on the Pennsylvania limited at 10:14 a. m. He left his home at Oyster Bay this morning and will spend the day with his two children, who are rapidly convalescing in Roosevelt hospital, this city. He is due in Chicago at 9 o'clock Friday morning and is scheduled to leave the Union depot, at which he will arrive 35 minutes later for Springfield, Ill., there to be the guest of Governor Yates and review the militia in the state camp.

#### AUTHORIZED TO SIGN.

Edict Reaches Pekin Empowering China and U. S. to Agree to Protocol.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—"Li Hung Chang has notified the ministers of the powers that the Chinese plenipotentiaries are now authorized to sign the protocol," says a dispatch to the Times from Peking dated yesterday, "and has requested them to fix a date for the signing."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—It has been determined at the war department to send the transport Sumner from San Francisco on Sept. 12 with the school teachers destined for the Philippines and such other passengers as may be connected with the civil insular government. It is probable that the Sumner will then remain in the islands. The transport Buford will sail from Manila Sept. 5 with troops to be stationed at military posts in the west. They will come by way of the line to New York.

### BIG LOSS TO STRIKERS

#### One Big Firm Cuts Loose From Union Labor Entirely.

#### VIOLENCE BEGINS AT IRONDALE

Strikers Assault Non-Unionists and Drive Them to Their Homes—Judge Refused to Grant Warrants For Rioting. Tube Workers Acted Too Hastily.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 28.—It is learned that President T. J. Shaffer has sent out letters to all members of the executive committee of the Amalgamated association inviting their approval of the peace plan agreed upon last Saturday by the representatives of the National Civic Federation and the Amalgamated association officials. The plan proposes: First—That the New York office of July 27, made by Messrs. Schwab and Morgan, be accepted. This provides that the tin plate mill resume under the scale signed for the year beginning July 1; that the hoop company sign for all mills signed for last year except Old Meadow and Sebasting.

Second—That a provisional scale be arranged, but not signed, for Painters, Lindsay and McCutcheon's, and the Clark mill, leaving the recognition of the union open.

Third—That the United States Steel corporation formally declared its attitude toward organized labor, this declaration to take such form as will have no insuring effect upon the union.

#### EMBEZZLED STRIKERS' FUNDS.

READING, Aug. 28.—A. H. Beecher, former chairman of the strikers' committee of the Reading railroad employees, charged with embezzling the strikers' funds, was arrested at Allentown last night.

#### CHINESE EDICT NO GOOD.

PEKING, Aug. 28.—The imperial edict forbidding the importation of arms and munitions of war is not satisfactory to the foreign ministers. A meeting of the ministers has been called to discuss the edict. It ignores the vital fact that the proposition applies to the government and that it is a part of the Chinese punishment. The edict makes it appear to be merely the government's ordinary act, prohibiting Chinese subjects from importing arms and munitions, as the country is disturbed by brigands.

#### NEGRO RAVISHER.

He Assaulted a Girl Last Night and May Be Frying Now.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 28.—Near Columbus, Mo., 40 miles south of here, Boss Francis, a negro, assaulted and killed Miss Maud Henderson last night at the home of her brother, in Lawton, on whose farm the negro worked. Francis escaped, but is being pursued by a posse from Columbus and Warrensburg and, probably, if caught, will be lynched.

#### Audubon Boy Won Park Brew Stakes.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Aug. 28.—Scott Hudson of Lexington, Ky., drove Audubon Boy to win the Park Brew \$10,000 stakes for 2-10 pacers at Narragansett Park yesterday in three straight heats.

#### Many Street Fights at Irondale.

The one place within this district where strikers have scored a victory at Irondale, Ohio. At this place the Amalgamated tin plate company was compelled to close down its recently opened plant for lack of men to operate it.

The day was full of excitement in the little village and street fights came thick and fast for a time until the inhabitants were wrought into a state of excitement bordering on terror. The first fight of the morning took place when five non-union men left their homes and started for work in the mill. On the main street of the village they were met by a party of about 30 strikers who, by moral suasion, tried to get them to desert from their determination to go to work. When this failed a stronger argument was used and the men were given a drubbing and taken back to their homes.

The village had scarcely recovered from the surprise which this attack occasioned when word was passed around that a party of new men were driving overland from Wellsview. Almost all the strikers at once started to meet them and when they passed the mill office Ira Householder, a non-union man, shouted at them. This action precipitated a fight. Manager Danfield saved Householder by dragging him inside and shutting the door with difficulty.

The tin plate company then attempted to file information before Justice Paisley charging the strikers with riot, but the justice refused to entertain the charge, saying he would issue warrants for those named in the fight, charging assault, but no more serious offense. The attorney then began preparations of papers to ask for an injunction restraining the strikers from interfering with the non-unionists in any way. All the men who have been employed in the mill joined the Amalgamated yesterday except Ira Householder and Jesse Hinesman.

### COUNSEL FOR SAMPSON

#### Said That He Will Be Represented at Board of Inquiry.

#### IF COURT WILL GIVE CONSENT

No Official Knowledge of Admiral's Intention But It is Privately Admitted—Said That W. H. Slayton of New York is Man Who Has Been Retained.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—It is understood that Admiral Sampson is to be represented before the Schley court of inquiry by counsel. The navy department officials say they have no official knowledge on the subject and point to the fact that the court of inquiry is the only body authorized to admit or debar counsel in such cases. It may, in its pleasure, deny the person under investigation the privilege of having counsel present before the court, or on the other hand it may go to the length of permitting persons in secondary interest the privilege of employing counsel before the court.

Officials say they have no knowledge officially of the retention of counsel by Admiral Sampson, but privately it is admitted that he expects to be so represented. It was learned yesterday that W. H. Slayton, of the law firm of Slayton & Chambers of New York, was retained at the navy department today and it is supposed that his purpose is to consult the records of the department in the interest of Admiral Sampson.

Mr. Slayton is a graduate of the naval academy, who, though coming out at the head of his class, elected to join the marine corps. He was detailed to duty in the office of the judge advocate general, and later resigned to practice law.

The list of witnesses prepared by Judge Advocate General Lemley and transmitted to Admiral Schley will be made public today. Some time ago Admiral Schley, in sending his list of witnesses to the department included a request for all the officers of the Brooklyn. The department replied that a number of officers of the Brooklyn would be on the list prepared by the department and asked him to have specifically named the Brooklyn's officers he desired. The admiral responded yesterday through Colonel Parker of his counsel. He gave the names of the principal officers of the Brooklyn and also of several petty officers, including the quartermasters who were at the wheel during the action off Santiago.

### MORMONS IN JAPAN.

#### Advent of Missionaries of Brigham Young's Faith Expected Much Comment.

YOKOHAMA, Aug. 28.—The advent of Mormon missionaries in Japan is exciting much comment. Four of them, headed by Apostle Grant, have already commenced an active campaign, and reportedly ejected from a missionary boarding house as soon as their faith was known, they have this early had a sample of the lack of Catholicity which characterizes the Christian workers of the Orient, and of the sectarian feeling which vitiate their work.

The incident will, however, redound greatly in their favor among the Japanese, whose hospitable and tolerant instincts form perhaps the most conspicuous feature of their character. They constantly quote with approval the story of an ancient emperor who, hearing of the arrival of emissaries of a foreign religion, asked how many religions there were already in the empire. On being told that there were forty or so, he said that in that case the addition of another was a matter of no consequence.

It may safely be foretold that while the Mormon doctrine will make, like the others which have been brought here, little or no impression upon the minds of the Japanese, their well known integrity and business energy will commend them to a large number of Japanese people. They stand as good a chance as any of the sects.

### CZAR WILL MEET EMPEROR

#### Will Also Meet King Edward on His Way to France.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail confirming the report that Emperor Nicholas and Emperor William will meet at Danzig, Sept. 10, says: "The czar and czarina will leave St. Petersburg in the Russian imperial yacht Standart, escorted by the cruiser Sveclana, Aug. 29, for Fredensborg, where they will meet King Edward and Emperor William."

#### Congratulates France on Czar's Visit.

MONTELEMAR, France, Aug. 28.—M. Loubet, before starting for Paris yesterday, addressed a deputation representing the municipality of Montlemar and, in the course of his remarks, referred to the forthcoming visit of the czar as proving that in both Russia and France the union of the two peoples was considered a powerful pledge for the security of peace.

#### British Warships to Go to Panama?

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 28.—H. M. S. Amphion yesterday loaded three scores of loads of ammunition, and the report is current, although no confirmation can be obtained, that she has been ordered to proceed to Panama, and the torpedo boat destroyers Virago and Sparrow Hawk are to go with her. The Virago's boilers have been taken apart and orders have been issued to work night and day on repairs, and have the destroyer ready to proceed.

#### Attorney General Knox at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Attorney General Knox has returned to the city, presumably to take up, among other things, the charges which have been preferred against Judge Humphreys of Honolulu.
